Training Centre in Communication (TCC Africa) is the first African-based training center with an aim to increase capacity for research output by training scientist on effective communication tools. TCC Africa is in partnership with the University of Nairobi, through a direct link with the School of Biological Sciences (SBS).

SCHOLARLY COMMUNICATION

In todays' competitive academic environment scientists need to know how to effectively communicate with their peers; beginning with coming up with a research idea, writing the proposal to communicating it. Beyond this, researchers need to understand the academic landscape and the research lifecycle process and how it can make them competitive

SCIENCE COMMUNICATION

We support published researchers, on how to translate their published work for various audiences. This is done through interactive workshops, where we bring science media partners, and science communication specialists and guide scientists how they can effectively communicate with different audiences.

In the year 2023, Training Centre in Communication (TCC Africa) had the privilege of engaging with four hundred and twenty three (423) early career researchers through our calendar of training events. These sessions served as invaluable opportunities for participants to delve into the multifaceted realm of Science and Scientific Communication, guided by accomplished industry leaders and seasoned trainers. Additionally, these training activities contributed significantly to our ongoing efforts in strengthening capacities across various institutions.

SCIENCE COMMUNICATION AND COMMUNICATING TO NON SCIENTISTS

Training Centre in Communication hosted the Science Communication- Communicating to Non Scientists, Policy Makers & The Media courses in the months of of January and October and facilitated by <u>Dr. Grace Mureithi</u>. The courses were designed to equip participants with a comprehensive set of skills and strategies for effective science communication. The concepts covered in this course are pivotal for scientists and researchers seeking to bridge the gap between their work and diverse audiences, fostering a culture that extends beyond the laboratory and academic circles. The concepts taught cover:

- Using Web 2.0 Tools for communicating research
- · Communicating to Policy Makers and the Press
- Producing Communication Outputs for Non Scientists
- How to participate at scientific conferences and how to interact with their peers

SCHOLARLY COMMUNICATION [ACADEMIC & RESEARCH PROPOSAL WRITING & OPEN SCIENCE]

Training Centre in Communication conducted a comprehensive series of trainings on Scientific Communication and Publishing, specifically focusing on the Paper Writing Process, Research Proposal Writing, and Data Management Analysis. These training sessions were strategically organized throughout the year, taking place in the months of February, May, August, and December, as indicated in the table below. The inclusion of the section on holistic well-being in the third quarter of the year is a noteworthy addition, driven by our recognition of the pressing importance of mental health within the research community. The course, expertly guided by Dr. Joyce Wangari and Nicholas Outa, delved into various subjects, encompassing academic and research proposal writing, open access and open science tools, and, notably, the critical aspect of holistic well-being in the research lifecycle.

RESOURCE MOBILIZATION AND GRANTS MANAGEMENT

In the third quarter of the year a collaborative training session aimed at enhancing the skills of early career researchers within the TCC Africa, Eider Africa, and University of Nairobi communities was held.

Training Objectives: The primary goals of the training were to educate early career researchers on key aspects of resource mobilization. Topics covered included understanding the donor's perspective, crafting impactful research proposals, and leveraging artificial intelligence for donor mapping and resource mobilization.

Training Highlights: The participants benefited from comprehensive sessions designed to deepen their understanding of critical elements in resource mobilization. The training emphasized effective proposal development and showcased the integration of Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools, Dimensions and for donor identification and engagement.

Training Objectives: The blended workshop aimed to equip the fourth-year undergraduate students with essential skills for effective communication in both academic and professional settings.



SOCIAL JUSTICE AND GENDER IN UNIVERSITIES

To commemorate International Women's Day 2023, with the support of UNESCO and the Organization for Women in Science for the Developing World (OWSD), the Training Centre in Communication (TCC Africa) was honored to host the community of African researchers and academics for a webinar titled 'Social Justice & Gender in Universities. In observance of the event theme "DigitALL: Innovation and technology for gender equality", the guest speakers explored various challenges faced by women in universities due to disparities in citations compared to their male colleagues and the impact this has on their careers.

This webinar was covered in the national Kenya newspaper, the <u>People Daily</u>, highlighting OWSD Nigeria National Chapter Chair Prof. Olayinka Ibiwumi Nwachukwu, who emphasized OWSD's role in creating awareness of women scientists through strategic partnerships as a means of increasing their citation and visibility. Training Centre in Communication (TCC Africa) organized a webinar focusing on the latest trends and advancements in African Research and Innovation, leveraging Dimensions data, in preparation for INORMS 2023. It featured a panel of experts from the African Population and Health Research Centre (APHRC) and Digital Science, our partner organization.

During her presentation, Dr. Evelyne Gitau, the Director of Research Capacity Strengthening at APHRC, highlighted the insights they have derived from data to support strategic planning and the growth of their fellowship program, <u>CARTA</u> (<u>Consortium for the Advancement of Research Training in Africa</u>). This expansion aims to create more opportunities for African scholars.

The second part of the webinar was led by Emily Alagha, the Technical Specialist, and Evangelia Lipitakis, the Product Solutions Manager for <u>Dimensions</u> & Altmetrics at Digital Science. They demonstrated to the attendees how to utilize the advanced analytics provided by Dimensions to enhance research discovery and improve access. There were four hundred and twenty-seven (427) registered participants.





Training Centre in Communication (TCC Africa), Kenya Institute for Public Policy Research and Analysis (KIPPRA), African Technology Policy Studies Network (ATPS) and Digital Science converged for a webinar titled 'Using African Policy Data to Monitor trends in Public Policy', with an aim to illuminate on the untapped potential of African policy data which when harnessed effectively can serve as a guiding light for policymakers and governments to steer decisions towards impactful outcomes. The webinar, held on 15th August 2023, featured insights from Dr. Nicholas Ozor, the Executive Director of the African Technology Policy Studies Network (ATPS), Mr. Eliud Moyi, the Principal Policy Analyst at Kenya Institute for Public Policy Research and Analysis (KIPPRA) and Michael Taylor, Head of Metrics Development at Digital Science. Distinguished speakers included Judith Barnsby, Head of Editorial at DOAJ, Ivan Oransky, Editor of Spectrum, as well as Ixchel Faniel and Dr. Haseeb Irfanullah, both esteemed scientific researchers. Each speaker provided valuable perspectives on the essence of trust and explored the various facets of mistrust prevalent in scholarly communications.

The webinar drew an audience of participants from numerous countries, totaling one hundred and twenty (120) attendees. Access the webinar recordings here





It was launched in 2003 with 300 open access journals. DOAJ works to build an equitable and diverse scholarly ecosystem where trusted research can be accessed globally without barriers.

INCREASING GHANAIAN ACADEMIC RESEARCH VISIBILITY THROUGH STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS

TCC Africa was privileged to collaborate with the Government of Ghana, facilitated by the <u>Ghana Tertiary Education Commission (GTEC</u>), the <u>Consortium of Academic and Research Libraries in Ghana (CARLIGH</u>), and supported by Digital Science's Altmetric and Dimensions, in hosting a national webinar on 'Increasing Ghanaian Academic Research Visibility Through Strategic Partnerships.' The webinar, held on December 15th, 2023, saw the participation of one hundred and twenty-seven (127) attendees.

The collaboration aimed to emphasize the pivotal role of strategic partnerships in augmenting the visibility of academic research in Ghana, and served as a platform for various stakeholders and key players in Ghana's academic and research community, marking a noteworthy milestone in advancing research visibility and fostering collaboration. Distinguished speakers who shared their insights during the webinar included Federica Silvi, Product Manager at Altmetric, Prof. Ahmed Jinapor Abdulai, Director-General of Ghana Tertiary Education Commission (GTEC), Emily Alagha, Senior Director of Research Analytics & Support at Digital Science, and Dr. Mac Anthony Cobblah, Chairperson of the Consortium of Academic and Research Libraries in Ghana (CARLIGH). 

A STRATEGIC RESOURCE MOBILIZATION WORKSHOP FOR STRENGTHENING UNIVERSITIES IN KENYA- MERU UNIVERSITY

In an effort to strengthen the self-sustainability of universities in Kenya, TCC Africa, in collaboration with the University of Florida (UF) Kenya Program, conducted a two-day workshop on resource mobilization at Meru University of Science and Technology (MUST). The primary goal of the workshop was to equip the senior management team at MUST with the necessary knowledge and skills to develop effective resource mobilization strategies. The workshop aimed to achieve the following objectives:

- · Identify strategic opportunities for resource mobilization.
- Develop a comprehensive resource mobilization strategy.
- Encourage diversification of resources and portfolio expansion.

The workshop resulted in the development of a comprehensive resource mobilization strategy document tailored to the specific needs and goals of Meru University of Science and Technology. This workshop was testament to TCC Africa and UF's collaborative vision to foster a thriving research ecosystem that contributes to the socioeconomic development in Kenya.

MUST is a leading research university in Kenya, offering a range of programmes in agriculture, business, education, engineering, healthcare and more.

The Universities Fund was established under section 53 of the Universities Act, 2012 for financing Universities in Kenya. The Fund is managed by a Board of Trustees known as the Universities Fund (UF) which has been in operation since 2016. The function of the Trustees is to generally manage the Universities Fund.

USING OPEN ACCESS AI IN IMPROVING THE ACADEMIC LIFECYCLE

In 2023, Training Centre in communication (TCC Africa) organized national and institutional workshops which featured hands on demonstrations co-facilitated by personnel from partner organizations, who guided the researchers on the use of Open Access Research Discovery tools to increase research output and visibility of early career researchers. The Open Access tools introduced were:

<u>Scholarly</u>, the online summarizing tool by Scholarcy is a tool that can quickly identify the key points and arguments of research papers as well as more easily critically analyze papers to understand how the research builds on or differs from prior studies and effectively interpret large collections of articles.

The <u>Open Research Library (ORL)</u>, by Knowledge Unlatched, is a user-friendly platform that enhances the discovery of worldwide open-access publications covering different disciplines.

<u>Dimensions</u>, by Digital Science, is a citation database that can be used to explore research grants, publications, citations, clinical trials, patents, and policy documents in one place.

The workshops saw an attendance of two thousand four hundred and fifty six (2456) participants.

HIGH LEVEL MULTI- SECTORAL NATIONAL OPEN SCIENCE DIALOGUE FOR ACADEMIC AND RESEARCH INSTITUTES IN TANZANIA

By invitation from the Government of Tanzania through the Consortium of Tanzania University and Research Libraries (COTUL), the Tanzania Commission for Universities (TCU) and the Tanzania Commission for Science and Technology (COSTECH), higher education leaders and policy makers from Tanzania, gathered for a high level national Open Science Policy Dialogue on 15th February 2023 in Dar-Es -Salaam. This was the first of a series of national-level conversations on Open Science aimed at advocating for its implementation in East Africa. The initiative has been an ongoing effort by the organizers- Training Centre in Communication (TCC Africa), the Public Library of Science (PLOS) and the East African Science and Technology Commission (EASTECO) to ensure that national conversations on Open Science are represented in the regional STI policy. There were three hundred and four (304) in the session.

SOUTHERN AFRICA REGIONAL DIALOGUE ON OPEN SCIENCE: PRETORIA, SOUTH AFRICA

On April 25th, 2023, more than seven hundred (700) scholars and stakeholders in higher education from southern Africa gathered at the University of Pretoria to engage in a dialogue about Open Science and the subsequent practical measures required for its implementation in the region. The blended workshop, dubbed, 'Regional Open Science Dialogue in Africa', provided a platform for the panel and participants to share best practices and explore innovative ways funders and HEIs can recognize and incentivize open science practices.

The Southern African Open Science dialogue aimed to achieve the following outcomes:

- Promote the effective adoption of Open Science and Open Access principles and practice among members of the Association of African Universities and respective governments
- Increase education and awareness on Open Science and Open Access in the Association of African Universities (AAU) member academic community and respective governments

THE KENYA NATIONAL OPEN SCIENCE DIALOGUE

In the Kenya National Open Science Dialogue held on September 20, 2023, at the University of Nairobi, national and regional stakeholders gathered to advocate for Open Science principles and practices in the East African Community Partner States. This collaborative effort, led by organizations such as EASTECO, PLOS, UON, UNESCO, KLISC, the Ministry of Education, and TCC Africa, aimed to break down barriers to knowledge sharing, address research inequalities, and promote equitable access to scientific information. The event featured prominent speakers, including Dr. Beatrice Muganda Inyangala, Principal Secretary of the State Department for Higher Education and Research. The dialogue marked a significant step in advancing Open Science principles and practices in the region, with a commitment to adopting Open Science policies in Kenya and supporting regional integration and socio-economic development through science and technology. This initiative builds on previous efforts and partnerships, emphasizing the importance of collaborative research and open access in academia. Researchers, librarians, and students were encouraged to embrace Open Science and Open Access for increased visibility, collaboration, and global impact. In culmination of the dialogue, the gathered representatives of policy actors from the Republic of Kenya made a resounding statement of intent.

Statement of Intent

"We, as the Representatives of policy actors from the Republic of Kenya, intend to adopt Open Science in Kenya and are willing to address any unintended challenges that arise from it. We will set up a working group to realize a national Open Science Policy. We will work with the national policy makers and present it to the government and potential implementing partners who will fund the process in support of the adoption of Open Science. It is in this spirit that we will continue to support the adoption of Open Science with leadership from the Higher Education Policy Actors."

The hybrid event attracted over one hundred and thirty-five (135) participants at the venue and three hundred and seventy four participants (374) participating virtually.

The workshop provided a platform for us to showcase our collaborative efforts with PLOS in hosting these dialogues across Africa. 

This workshop was an opportunity for the network to present findings from the Inspire PEACH project a platform for evaluation and analysis of COVID-19 harmonised data in Africa. By sharing these findings, the workshop aimed to foster collaboration and encourage the use of data science and AI tools to better understand and respond to the COVID-19 pandemic on the continent. The discussions were pertinent to TCC Africa's core tenet, Open Infrastructure, which aims to promote the use of open and accessible technology and tools in the field of communication and data management. As part of the Open Infrastructure initiative, TCC Africa has established the Africa PID Alliance, which will play a crucial role in supporting open and persistent identification of research outputs, datasets, contributors, thus contributing to the overall goals of data sharing and collaboration. The event was attended by fifty (50) participants.



INTRODUCING THE INASP GENDER MAINSTREAMING TOOLKIT TO OWSD KENYA MEMBERS

TCC Africa was honored to host the INASP Gender Mainstreaming Toolkit workshop on December 14, 2023. The objective of this workshop was to familiarize members of the Organization for Women in Science for the Developing World (OWSD) with the content and utilization of the Gender Mainstreaming in Higher Education Toolkit developed by INASP. A total of thirtyone (31) participants actively engaged in the workshop. The workshop was structured around the expertise of facilitators Prof. Flora Fabian Mbatia and Mai Hoff Skovgaard who guided the participants to the toolkit's content, applications, and success stories from its implementation in various institutions globally. The INASP Gender Mainstreaming Toolkit is a comprehensive resource designed to support universities, higher education institutions, and research initiating gender mainstreaming processes. institutes in Developed collaboratively by Sue Gollifer, Siobhan Gorman, Flora Fabian, and the University of Dodoma (UDOM) in partnership with INASP, the toolkit employs a participatory approach to identify and address organizational gender gaps. It provides a structured framework for creating a gender action plan, launching formal gender mainstreaming processes within institutions, and fostering an open and safe space for participants to share diverse personal experiences and opinions. The toolkit is organized around six modules, guiding participants through a learning journey from gender sensitization to the development of concrete action plans.



UON RESEARCH WEEK 2023- HARNESSING RESEARCH FOR RESILIENCE AND SUSTAINABILITY OF COMMUNITIES.

TCC Africa actively participated in the University of Nairobi's Research Week, contributing to the event's success and aligning with the university's commitment to Research and Innovation. This annual gathering, from October 23rd to 27th, 2023, marked the sixth edition organized by the university, featuring a diverse array of conferences and webinars spread across its ten faculties. TCC Africa's team actively participated in training sessions on scholarly communication and open science organized by the Faculty of Science and Technology. The sessions were attended by over three hundred (300) participants.





Under the overall theme, "Harnessing Research for Resilience and Sustainability of Communities," researchers, staff, and students collectively addressed pressing challenges, including climate change, food insecurity, youth unemployment, human health, and the high cost of living. TCC Africa has been in partnership with the university for the last fifteen years supporting researchers in improving their output and visibility through training in scholarly and science communication and helping communicate their them research findings more effectively and to connect with wider audiences.

SUPERVISOR AND SCHOLARLY COMMUNICATION TRAINING FOR OWSD KENYA MEMBERS

TCC Africa, in collaboration with the OWSD Kenya Chapter, organized a training session on October 18, 2023, focusing on "Supervisor and Scholarly Communication Training." The joint effort aimed to provide crucial guidance and support to Early Career Supervisors for Postgraduate Students, fostering effective mentorship and advancing scholarly communication within the academic community. This collaborative initiative reflects the shared commitment of TCC Africa and OWSD Kenya to empower professionals and contribute to the development of a vibrant and inclusive research ecosystem. Facilitated by academic experts, the sessions covered a spectrum of topics. Dr. Joyce Wangari focused on personal management, providing insights into effective time management and strategies for maintaining mental health. Dr. Virginia Gichuru further discussed the supervisor's role in managing students, including mentorship, research proposal development, and overseeing the entire Ph.D. program. The session also highlighted effective research discovery, critical thinking, academic publishing, and strategies for supporting researchers' visibility. Professor Verdiana Masanja led the discourse on the different dynamics of PhD supervision. This comprehensive training not only addressed the nuances of supervision but also underscored the importance of scholarly communication in the academic landscape, fostering a holistic approach to postgraduate student development. The event had sixty five (65) participants.



The focus is on identifying concrete next steps to improve information flow and interoperability, and help solve existing and potential future problems.



THE UNITED NATIONS 3RD OPEN SCIENCE CONFERENCE

Training Centre in Communication (TCC Africa) was delighted to be part of the United Nation's 3rd Open Science Conference held in New York from 8 to 10 February 2023. The focus of their talk was on the Digital Science and TCC Africa partnership, which has been in effect since 2019. During the IDW 2023 held in Salzburg, Austria, from October 23rd to 26th, the TCC Director had the honor of presenting the African PID Alliance, an open infrastructure program by TCC Africa (https://tcc-africa.org/persistent-identifiers/). Emphasizing the significance of accommodating various Persistent Identifiers (PIDs), the Director engaged with partners and participated in a dedicated meeting on persistent identifiers on the third day of the conference. This meeting underscored the critical role of connecting research objects referenced in metadata, with notable contributors including Prof. Maui Hudson of Local Contexts, Dr. Jonathan Clark of DOI Foundation, and Matt Buys of CrossRef. The session was attended by sixty (60) participants.






A RECIPIENT OF TCC AFRICA'S WORK STUDY PROGRAM GRADUATES




CELEBRATING MAZUNGUMZO- AFRICAN SCHOLARLY CONVERSATIONS PODCAST MILESTONES
